20 Life Messages & Teachings from the Baal Shem Tov, the Founder of Chassidus, in honor of his birthday on Chai (18th) Elul



The Baal Shem Tov was fond of light, for the Hebrew words light "Ohr" and secret "Raz" share a numerical letter value: knowing the inner meaning is illuminating!

Never suffice with surface. Plumb the depths of Torah, indeed the depth of one's sou!!



Entering within works of loran is protective from workly turbulence. Get into it!

The Hebrew for Ark "Teivah" also means Word.

Reading the Megillah backwards does not fulfill the obligation.

Why would the Mishna tell us not to read the story backwards? This refers to viewing it in past-tense, as merely historical without current relevance.



The difference between apathy & assimilation is a very fine line.

'he Baal Shem Tov was all about warmth. Cold Judaism doesn't cut it.

Finding joy in all things and thoughtful enthusiasm are considered biblical Mitzvot for Chassidim.
